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Main migration trends in the Caribbean

- The Caribbean is:
 - A region of origin, transit, and destination of extra-regional and intraregional migration flows;
 - A region of NET emigration;
- Main Migration Trends:
 - From Haiti to Dominican Republic, Dominica, Bahamas, Turks and Caicos, Brazil;
 - From Guyana to Trinidad and Tobago and other islands;
 - From Caribbean to Guadalupe, Martinique and T&T (agriculture);
 - From Guyana, Jamaica, Trinidad and Tobago to Europe and North America;



Caribbean as a source of migrant labour

- 1. Labour migration: extra-regional and intraregional focus;
- NET exporter of medium to skilled labour (agriculture and construction; health and education sectors);
- CSME and OECS Free movement schemes have facilitated movement of professionals and citizens;
 - Facilitated the for reconstruction purposes to islands hit by natural disasters;
- 4. Large diaspora around the world: Caribbean is a **net receiver** of remittances:
 - Haiti and the Dominican Republic most prominent receivers.



Challenges and opportunities:

- Loss of human capital VS capturing the benefits of incoming migration (return migration and retirees);
- Updating national labour migration policies VS lack of reliable and comparable data;
- CSME: benefits VS challenges*!
- Growing number of migrants from the Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela VS small economies;
- Increasing challenges by climate change: Dominica



How to increase the opportunities?

- Caribbean countries' labour supply to the rest of the world is essential for receiving countries:
 - Strengthen negotiation of bilateral labour agreements;
 - Strengthen protection of migrant workers abroad ethical recruitment practices;
 - Tackle abuse, exploitation of migrants on their national territory;
